Programme Notes

The Armed Man: A Mass for Peace written by Welsh composer Karl Jenkins had its premiere at the Royal Albert Hall in London on 25 April 2000. It had been commissioned by the Royal Armouries Museum for the Millennium celebrations and was dedicated to victims of the Kosovo crisis.

The Armed Man is based on the Catholic Mass. The choral suite, which we are performing this evening consists of Kyrie, Sanctus, Benedictus and Agnus Dei and ends with Hymn Before Action based on a poem by Rudyard Kipling.

The CD recording with Karl Jenkins conducting the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra and the National Youth Choir of Great Britain was released on 10 September 2001, the day before the tragic events in the United States, making the anti-war message of the piece even more relevant and poignant.

This familiar tune will be familiar to many, possibly reminding you of animals marching in two by two. However, here in *Johnny, I Hardly Knew Ye*, the tune is heard as a solemn march. The lyrics of this traditional Irish folk song tell of a woman surprised by a meeting with her former love on the road to Athy. He was an injured soldier who had just returned from war. The song makes reference to Ceylon and may have been written as an anti-recruitment song in response to the Kandyan Wars (1795-1818). The story resonated strongly with people and it remained a popular anti-war song through-out the 19th and 20th centuries.

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In addition to his prolific German language work, Bohemian-Austrian poet and novelist Rainer Maria Rilke (1875-1926) also wrote more than 400 poems in French. In *Les Chansons des Roses*, Morten Lauridsen set to music a cycle of five lyrical French poems from Rilke's *Les Roses* collection. The musical style chosen for each poem was intended to enhance the nature of the verse. *Dirait-on*, a poem on the theme of the mythical Narcissus, was composed as a melodic *chanson populaire* or folk song.

Programme Notes

The Seal Lullaby was written in 2004 by Eric Whitacre for an animated feature being planned by a major film company. It was based on Rudyard Kipling's poem of the same name. In the end, the film company chose to make a different animated film, but the piece which had been inspired by the project endured. The poem starts with the mother seal singing softly to her young pup. The music swells and recedes like the sea, soothing the baby seal to sleep.

Danzas Cubanas is a set of three original dance-like movements written in 2010 by Robert Sheldon and celebrating the joy and energy of Afro-Cuban music.

The opening conga sets the mood, followed by a gentle and alluring son-salsa. The closing dance is a fast-paced mambo. The piece features solos on a range of instruments and gives the percussionists a great opportunity to show their skills.

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Doxy was written by the renowned saxophonist Sonny Rollins during a stopover in England on a 1950s European tour. When Rollins eventually established his own record label in 2006, he named it Doxy Records. Doxy has become a jazz standard and is frequently performed and recorded.



Don't Know Why, written in 1999 by award winning singer and songwriter Jesse Harris, is most widely known through the Norah Jones version, which won three Grammy Awards in 2003, including Song of the Year. This popular jazz number has been covered by many artists worldwide including Pat Metheny, Smokey Robinson and George Benson.

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It's Only A Paper Moon was written by Harold Arlen for a 1932 Broadway play, The Great Magoo. The play proved to be unsuccessful, closing after 11 performances, but the song was a hit. The song was revived in the 1940s by artists including Ella Fitzgerald and Nat King Cole. It made a further comeback in 1973 with the release of Peter Bogdanovich's classic film "Paper Moon" starring father and daughter, Ryan and Tatum O'Neal.



Santa Fe Bandalero with its driving Latin rock groove takes us in a modern direction. It was written in 2000 by contemporary American composer, George Shutack, whose day job is writing computer software.

Sing Sing, a well known swing song originally written in 1936 by Louis Prima for voices and instruments, was made famous a year later through Benny Goodman's energetic instrumental version. In this 2007 a cappella arrangement by Deke Sharon, it is the instruments that have been dropped and the vocal parts now act as the various sections of a big band.

With its accompaniment of percussion instruments, the Swahili song *Amani* is a joyful celebration of peace:

Amani: Peace

Tuna imba wimbo wetu: We are singing our song Huu ni wimbo wetu wa amani: This is our song of peace

American composer William L. Dawson (1899 -1990) is well known for choral arrangements of traditional spirituals including **Soon Ah Will Be Done**. Spirituals are a uniquely American genre, originating among enslayed Africans and their descendants. They combine religious themes with musical and rhythmic elements traceable to African sources.

Oye was composed by Jim Papoulis for a music project for The Foundation for Small Voices. As part of this foundation, Papoulis travels around the world leading songwriting workshops for children with the aim of inspiring and empowering them through music. Oye was inspired by a workshop in Mexico where the message that the children wanted to communicate through song was to listen

All alone, in the darkness
They are crying out for your help
They are hoping, they are dreaming
They are asking, for a change to be heard.

Are you listening, can you hear their cries?

They are watching, they are listening They are searching to find their way Can you see them, can you hear them calling What their voices are trying to say.

Programme Notes

The music for the 1994 Walt Disney film *The Lion King* was written by Hans Zimmer and Elton John. The Lion King was released on 15 June 1994 to a positive reaction from critics. The film was praised for its music, story and animation and went on to become the highest-grossing release of 1994.

In 1995 The Lion King was awarded two Academy Awards for music: the award for Best Original Score was awarded to Hans Zimmer and the award for Best Original Song was awarded to Elton John and Tim Rice. This evening's arrangement includes: This Land, Circle of Life, I Just Can't Wait To Be King, Under the Stars, Hakuna Matata and Can You Feel The Love Tonight.

Blue Cat Blues is a 1956 Tom and Jerry cartoon directed and produced by William Hanna and Joseph Barbera. For the first time ever in a Tom and Jerry cartoon, Jerry takes the role of narrator. He tells the story of how Tom had his heart broken by a beautiful white female cat.

Before this event, Tom and Jerry had been best friends. But after Tom lost his love to a rival cat, Butch, everything changed. Jerry tries to prevent Tom making a fool of himself but Tom is desperate to win her back and tries to out-compete Butch at every turn. This includes giving her presents of flowers, perfume, a diamond ring and a car, but Butch's presents are always bigger and better than Tom's and he fails in his quest.

The music mirrors the action and you may be able to hear when Tom and Jerry are happily sitting together having a drink, when Tom's new love walks by and also when Jerry jumps on Tom's tail to stop him getting into trouble.
